OPCIÓN A

More Egyptian artefacts stolen

The American University in Cairo (AUC) announced last week that one of the storehouses located <u>beneath</u> its old campus was raided. An initial inventory has revealed that 145 authentic pieces and 50 replicas were stolen, Zahi Hawass, Egyptian Minister for Antiquities Affairs told media outlets.

- The items stolen were never on public display due to lack of space and the <u>strict</u> security measures needed, according to the AUC.
 - The lost artefacts include items from ancient Egypt as well as Coptic and Islamic origin. In a statement <u>released</u>, the AUC said they are "deeply disturbed by what appears to have been the theft of antiquities in their custody."
- The university said they are cooperating with the official judicial investigation, "as well as conducting an internal one of their own."
 - When contacted, the AUC <u>declined</u> to give any further information or to comment on anything, but said they will make the findings of their investigations public once it is <u>complete</u>.
- The items are legally the property of the AUC and are registered with the government as part of Egypt's national heritage collection. The artefacts were discovered during excavations in 1946 when the law then said that excavators could keep a part of their findings.
- This is the most recent in a series of thefts that have taken place in different places in Egypt following a security vacuum after the January 25 Revolution. Several pieces were either stolen or broken within the Egyptian Museum of Antiquities during the revolution. A few days after the president was extradited, several storehouses around the area of the Giza Pyramids were raided and stolen.

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OPCIÓN B

WHY PEOPLE GET TATTOOS

Getting a tattoo because your friends and peers have them is just one of the reasons why a lot of young people in Spain get tattoos. Peer pressure, media influence, and personal expression are some of the <u>common</u> reasons for wearing tattoos today.

- The desire to be part of a group, to be accepted by one's friends or peers, can have a great influence on what a person does. Sometimes, wearing a tattoo can be a sign that you belong to a certain group. Gangs often use special clothes and tattoos to identify their particular group. When a person's friends are all doing something, such as getting a tattoo, that person is more likely to do the same thing, and get a tattoo too.
- The media is another big influence behind the popularity of tattoos in Spain. A <u>wide</u> variety of media images show tattoos. Famous sports heroes with tattoos are <u>shown</u> in magazines. Fashion models are often seen in magazines and on TV wearing designer clothes that show their bodies tattooed with detailed and colourful patterns. These media images link tattoos to ideas of wealth, success, and status. As a result, many people decide to get a tattoo for its fashion and status value.
- There are also many people who decide to wear tattoos in order to express their artistic nature, their beliefs, or their feelings -- in other words, to show their individuality. A tattoo can be a public sign to show what is important in a person's life.

As you can see, a tattoo can be part of a group's uniform. It can be a sign of fashion. It can be an expression of individuality. The decision to get a tattoo is most often a result of the influence of friends or media or the desire to express oneself.
