<u>OPCIÓN A</u>

Muscle madness: more teens are bulking up 1 Teens put a high value on muscular builds and increasingly take chances with their health to get them. When it comes to body image, more is better, at least when it comes to muscle, according to a recent study on teens and body image. The analysis involved 2,793 middle- and high school students who reportedly bulk up* by using products like steroids and protein powders. The scientists found that the adolescents see toned and muscular bodies as the ideal. They are willing to change eating and exercise habits, as well as 5 using supplements, protein powders and steroids that have been linked to adverse health effects, to intensify muscle development. The results of the study show that 12% of boys and 6% of girls are engaged in three or more different behaviours to gain muscle. This finding suggests that, in addition to a 'thin ideal', muscularity is an 10 important component of body satisfaction for both genders. "There are many <u>confusing</u> messages in our society regarding what is healthy. While it is appropriate to aim to be physically fit and be involved in physical activity, this should be done through healthy eating and activity behaviours," says Neumark-Sztainer, a professor of community health at the University of Minnesota. She added, "We need to move away from the idea of an 'ideal body shape' toward an 15 acceptance of diverse body shapes and sizes." "There are all these media images of muscularity, which is a newer trend," says Greenberg, a clinical psychologist. "When kids hear the message that they need to be perfect, they do whatever it takes even if it means something unhealthy," says Robyn Silverman, a body image expert. "They may realize there are some risks to what they're doing, but the result is better than the negative impact." Teens have a way of saying to themselves, "That won't happen to me." 20 Both Silverman and Greenberg blame social media with inundating kids with images of beefy* men and toned women. 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<u>OPCIÓN B</u>

"Je suis Charlie"

- 1 Religion is a form of organized belief or ideology that guides a group of people. It is as old as history itself. Religion is supposed to be practised without any form of <u>interference</u> because we are free moral agents, thus free to make our individual choices. There are many religions recognized all over the world. Freedom of religion is one of our fundamental human rights.
- 5 However, a group of extremists are interfering with this fundamental right. They are the Jihadists or anti-Semites who apparently use the name of Islam to commit evil. These radicalized extremists are trying to <u>succeed</u> in identifying the Islamic religion with radicalism. These extremists fight against western education, against Jews, Christians and moderate Islamists.
- There is no doubt that Islam <u>preaches</u> peace but, <u>ironically</u>, the identification of these radical extremists with Muslims makes it seem like terrorism has been incorporated into Islam. On the contrary, a majority of the Muslim clerics all over the world, showing that they do not support these attacks, condemn the perpetrators of the terrorist attacks whenever these extremists hit new targets.

In Paris, the latest attack on *Charlie Hebdo* Magazine journalists and cartoonists shook the entire world. The magazine was the target of two terrorist attacks, in 2011 and in 2015, presumed to be in response to a number of controversial cartoons it published about Muhammad. The second of these attacks left 12 people dead and 11 others injured. This is an act of suppression of the freedom of speech and expression as well as an attack on the liberty of individual citizens and the press. This should not be possible in a democratic society or anywhere else.

French hashtag *Je suis Charlie* -meaning "I am Charlie"- is being used by tweeters who wish to show refusal to be silenced by the massacre. (304 words)
