	Are Selfies a Sign of Narcissism and Psychopathy?
1	If you are one of those persons who likes taking selfies, you better read this! In a recent investigation scientists said that taking tons of selfies could be <u>linked</u> to narcissism, addiction and mental illness.
5	Dr. David Veal determined that taking selfies can be diagnosed as a mental health problem. As an example of how some people become so obsessed with taking the perfect selfie, we could mention one 19-year old boy in Britain, Danny Brown, who was taking <u>at least</u> 200 photos of himself every day. He suffers from obsessive-compulsive disorder (OCD) and body dysmorphic disorder (BDD)* and he developed a selfie addiction. After dropping out of* school, losing 15 kilos and not leaving his house for 6 months, Danny Brown discovered that he couldn't take the perfect selfie and tried to commit suicide. Dr. Veal said, "Since the rise of camera phones, two out of three of all the patients who come to see me with BDD have a compulsion to repeatedly take selfies".
	The 19-year old British male explained, "I was constantly <u>in search of</u> taking the perfect selfie and when I realized I couldn't, I wanted to die. I lost my friends, my education, my health and almost my life." He is believed to be the UK's first selfie addict and has received therapy for his technology addiction as well as his OCD and body dysmorphic disorder.
15	"Paying <u>close</u> attention to published photos, controlling who sees or who likes or comments them, hoping to reach the greatest number of likes are all symptoms that 'selfies' are causing problems", said Panpimol Wipulakorn, of the Thai Mental Health Department. The doctor believes that these behaviors could <u>generate</u> brain problems in the future, especially for people who lack confidence.

	Syrian Refugees in Iceland, 3000 Miles from Home!
1 5	Every year, a few hundred thousand tourists travel to the <u>snowy</u> town of Akureyri in the far north of Iceland, in search of ski slopes and whale watching trips. Yet the town's newest <u>inhabitants</u> know nothing about these attractions. In fact, until a couple of months ago, Khattab Al Mohammad and his family had not even heard of Iceland. They are Syrian refugees who have been offered a new life in the country.
10	As Mr Al Mohammad said, "This wasn't the plan." The 48-year-old former high school English teacher, his wife and their six children were among 35 Syrians <u>welcomed</u> to Iceland last month. The majority of refugees who have fled the war in Syria have settled in camps in Lebanon or Jordan or been granted asylum in Germany or other continental European countries. But more distant countries, <u>including</u> New Zealand and Canada, have also accepted immigrants. Iceland, which has a population of 323,000, has promised to accept an initial allocation of 75 refugees.
15	Like the other families, the Al Mohammads did not apply to come to Iceland. They left their home in the city of Aleppo in 2012 following repeated missile attacks in their neighbourhood. They spent three years living in Lebanon, in an abandoned garage, where Mr Al Mohammad and his wife slept beside their 18-year-old daughter and their five sons. The United Nations gave them free water and electricity but there was no formal education for their children.
20	When a United Nations agency asked Mr Al Mohammad last year if his family would like to go to Iceland, he was greatly surprised. "I didn't have the slightest idea where Iceland was", he commented. But the family is now living in a large house provided by the local council. Their new neighbours have donated winter clothes and the family is being given free lessons in Icelandic for two hours a day. Once they have <u>mastered</u> the basics, the children will start school.
