GRUPO A

***AI ChatGPT amazes professors with essay-writing skills and usability**

Professors, programmers and journalists could all be out of a job in just a few years, after ChatGPT, from the Elon Musk-founded OpenAI foundation, stunned spectators with its writing ability, proficiency at complex tasks, and ease of use.

5 The system, called ChatGPT, is the latest evolution of the GPT family of text-generating AIs. Two years ago, the team’s previous AI, GPT3, was able to generate an opinion article for the Guardian newspaper, and now the new ChatGPT has significant further capabilities.

In the days since it was released, professors have generated responses to exam questions that they say would result in top marks if they were written by a student.

10 Dan Gillmor, a professor in journalism at Arizona State University, asked the AI to carry out one of the assignments he gives his students: writing a letter to a relative giving advice about online security and privacy. The chatbot advised: “If you’re unsure about the legitimacy of a website or email, you can do a quick search to see if others have reported it as being a scam.”

“I would have given this a good grade,” Professor Gillmor said. “Universities have some very serious issues to confront.”

15 OpenAI said the new AI was created with a focus on ease of use. “The dialogue format makes it possible for ChatGPT to answer follow-up questions, admit its mistakes, challenge incorrect ideas, and reject inappropriate requests,” OpenAI said in an online post announcing the release of the software.

Unlike previous AI from the company, ChatGPT has been released for anyone to use, for free, during a “feedback” period. This information would help the company to improve the final version of the tool.

20 ChatGPT is good at self-censoring, and at realising when it is being asked an impossible question. For example, it was asked to describe what happened when Columbus arrived in America in 2015. Older models would most likely have presented an entirely fictitious account, but the new ChatGPT recognises the false information and warns that any answer would be fictional.

25 The bot is also capable of refusing to answer questions altogether. Ask it for advice on stealing a car, for example, and the bot will say that “stealing a car is a serious crime that can have severe consequences”, and instead gives alternatives such as “using public transportation”.

GRUPO B

Was the Qatar FIFA World Cup really carbon-neutral?

5 From the moment that Qatar was controversially awarded the 2022 FIFA World Cup in 2010, it promised that the football tournament would be carbon-neutral, a difficult promise to keep for any big sporting event organizer since you need to build new infrastructure, accommodate teams and fans, move them around, and run the actual games. It was an even more demanding challenge in this small Gulf state, which is heavily reliant on fossil fuels, extremely hot, and which had almost no suitable facilities before the event.

10 However, the Qatari state still claimed that almost all the stadiums built for the World Cup were constructed with regional, reused, and recycled materials. (Just one venue, Stadium 974, used shipping containers as building blocks so that it could be fully deconstructed and reassembled after the tournament). They also said that, to handle Qatar’s heat, stadiums were going to use a novel cooling system, powered by a solar farm in the desert, that consumes 40 percent less energy than any other cooling system on the market.

15 The methods and calculations used to get to net-zero were particularly dubious, according to the non-profit Carbon Market Watch (CMW). Undoubtedly, the emissions levels were underestimated. Qatar had to import building materials to construct the stadiums. Even the grass seeds for playing surfaces were flown in from the United States. In addition, maintaining a football pitch in the desert in November and December needs 10,000 litres of desalinated seawater a day. Desalinating that water requires lots of energy, and nearly 100% of the country’s energy comes from oil and gas. Besides, it is hard to understand how the stadiums can continue to be used effectively after the tournament in such a small country, with fewer than 3 million inhabitants and that will not become a tourist centre overnight. All the investment was designed for a few weeks, which most people would consider totally unsustainable.

20 Even so, infrastructure only accounted for around a quarter of the Cup’s emissions. You still need to include travel and accommodation. Air travel alone represented 44% of total emissions. According to an official report, the tournament produced around 3.6 million tons of carbon dioxide, more than some countries emit in a year.

25 Despite the efforts of Qatar to convince the world, the 2022 World Cup cannot be considered carbon neutral. In fact, final emissions were even higher than predicted because a shortage of accommodation in Doha, Qatar’s capital city, forced many fans to stay in neighbouring countries, requiring hundreds of flights that had not been considered in previous calculations.
